

**Emergency Plan** 

So far, we've suggested apps that warn you of imminent disasters, and described where to buy emergency preparedness kits or what to include if you're creating your own.

This month's topic: creating a Family Emergency Plan.

## Gather with your family to confirm:

- Safe spots in each room where you could take cover sturdy tables, desks, interior walls.
- Escape routes from your home, including alternate ways out of each room.
- Two family meeting places one in your neighborhood and another outside to meet at in event of an evacuation.
- The location of shutoff valves and how to turn off your water, gas and electricity.
- Emergency policies of schools and adult-care centers, including shelters, supplies and transportation. Notify schools who will pick up your children if you're unable to get there.
- An emergency contact list with phone numbers and emails. Store on your cell phone and make copies for your house, car and emergency kit.
  - Create a text message group so you can communicate quickly.
- An out-of-state contact you can call after a disaster (it may be easier to make an out of state call when phone lines are jammed). Everyone can check in with the out-of-state contact.
  - $\circ$   $\,$  Texts are more likely to succeed than calls and leaves lines open for 9-1-1 calls.
- Who will take your important documents including medical information/insurance for all family members -- if you have to evacuate. Upload them to the cloud and store hard-copies in <u>a fire-safe</u> <u>pouch</u> or in a sealed plastic bag in the freezer.

## Helping children

Have age-appropriate conversations about disasters and make sure kids know family meeting locations. Make sure your children know:

- Their home address and family phone numbers
- How and when to call 9-1-1
- What to do if the smoke or carbon monoxide alarm goes off

Importantly - test your family emergency plan at least once/year and update it as needed.
